Both governments are reported to have been told that the obstinacy of Panama over the acceptance of the White House award, insisted upon by the American government, must not be made the basis for the renewal of hostilities.

It was not revealed in what way the United States has made known that it would regard hostilities with keen displeasure, but it is assumed that representations have been sent to both Panama City and San José.

Official reports received here recently have indicated that peace on the isthmus again was about to be disturbed. They said Panama was mobilizing her armed forces, and was

handling only 200 jury cases a year, Mr. Benton said. He also announced plans for organization of a bureau of volunteer lawyers to enforce the civil sections of the new law. In this connection he said injunctions would be sought against the sale of liquors in all places where proof of sale has been obtained.
